



COUNCIL

Mayor

(elected at-large)

6 Councillors


(elected in 3 wards)

1 Deputy Mayor

(selected from 6 Councillors)

BOUNDARIES

Retained from 3 pre-amalgamation municipalities



Legislative Framework



Re. municipal system of representation, Ontario's *Municipal Act, 2001* authorizes a lower-tier municipality to:

- define the size (composition) of Council
- determine how Council (other than the Mayor) will be elected
- "divide or re-divide the municipality into wards or dissolve the existing wards"

The Trent Hills Council Composition Review

Prepared Council to make decisions on whether to:



- change or retain the way the Deputy Mayor is selected;
- change or retain the present composition of Council; and
- retain the existing ward structure or to adopt an alternative arrangement.

The Trent Hills Council Composition Review



At its meeting on March 17, 2020, Council approved five resolutions.

Commencing with the Municipal Election in 2022,

the Municipality of Trent Hills continues to elect Councillors in a ward system;


the composition of Council be maintained at 7 members, including the Mayor;

the position of Deputy Mayor be elected at-large (by general vote);

A New Ward System for Trent Hills



A set of guiding principles should be consulted to evaluate "effective representation" by the wards:

Representation by population
Protection of communities of interest
Recognition of natural or man-made barriers or dividers as boundaries
Recognition of density
Recognition of areas of growth/decline
Ward boundaries that accommodate growth/shifts in population for at least 3 municipal elections.

The Ward Boundary Review



Clarifying the guiding principles:

Effective Representation Is The Overarching Guiding Principle

Each ward consists of roughly the same number of people Representation by (the principle of voter "parity") some variation will be considered acceptable (25%) population calculations include both permanent and seasonal residents As far as possible, wards should be cohesive units and areas Protection of Communities with common interests related to representation of Interest boundaries are drawn around communities, not through them Recognition of natural or Ideally boundaries are not arbitrary lines on a map man-made barriers or should rely on recognizable and permanent & easily remembered "markers" dividers as boundaries

The Ward Boundary Review



Clarifying the guiding principles:

Recognition of density

Wards should of a compact, contiguous shape

 should accommodate variations in the densities and characteristics of residential settlement across a municipality

Recognition of areas of growth/decline

Ward populations should give some weight to projected population growth within the Municipality

 avoid wards that will be out-of-date the day after they are adopted

Ward boundaries that accommodate growth/shifts in population for at least 3 municipal elections

Wards electoral boundaries have a limited lifespan

A New Ward System for Trent Hills



- Ideal result of this electoral redistribution would be "full parity" in the population of the five wards while meeting all of the principles
- Ideal wards are impossible because of the limits imposed by the social and natural environment of the municipality and the guiding principles
- Requires a "renovation" of the present ward model, but it need not mean a complete "demolition" of the way people understand Trent Hills and its component parts
 - local identification with and "allegiances" to historic communities are not erased because those areas are now aligned differently to elect Councillors
